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Message from the vice president and chief nursing officer

Our annual report gives us an opportunity to reflect on our accomplishments from the past year. I beam with pride knowing the hard work, dedication and passion our team brings every day. The past couple of years have presented unique challenges in health care. We have not been immune to the postpandemic workforce shortages, supply chain disruptions or soaring patient volume experienced by children's hospitals across our nation. Through collaboration, innovation and our team's unwavering commitment, we are starting to see signs of stability.

A significant accomplishment we achieved together was stabilizing our workforce. In 2022, our two-year nursing strategic plan was dedicated exclusively to rebuilding, restoring and retaining our workforce. Since that time, hundreds of new nurses have joined our team and, in the true spirit of nursing, our experienced nurses rallied to support, train and enculturate them into our Norton Children's Hospital family.

Reaching for Zero remains our North Star and drives us to constantly improve. We remained vigilant in setting the standard for quality and caring for our patients and families. We redesigned our onboarding processes and provided additional education, training and refined processes to hardwire best practices and strengthen our safety culture. Our outcomes reflect that all these efforts are making a difference.

We have so much to be proud of and celebrate! This is the first Norton Children's Hospital annual report in over a decade. The stories included demonstrate and recognize the nursing excellence that exists within our walls every day. Here are a few examples:

- We kick-started our Magnet journey! In early 2024, we announced our commitment to apply for Magnet status. This elite honor is based on nursing research conducted and replicated over the past 40-plus years. Hospitals demonstrating Magnet standards outperform in nursing-specific quality outcomes and patient experience, and have a work environment that promotes nursing excellence. Only about 10% of hospitals nationwide achieve this special recognition.
- Norton Children's Hospital "reimagined" our professional governance structure, providing enhancements that help support direct-care nurses being involved in decisions affecting their practice. We now have a stronger and more robust structure that empowers nurses to own our practice and results.
- We launched Lead for Care, a six-month program focused on developing nurses as bedside leaders. Participants are partnered with an experienced mentor and develop their "leader within" by leveraging a variety of learning modalities. More than 50% of our participants move on to expand their roles and/or involvement in the organization.

Join me in celebrating our many accomplishments and the opportunities that lie ahead as we continue along our Magnet journey.



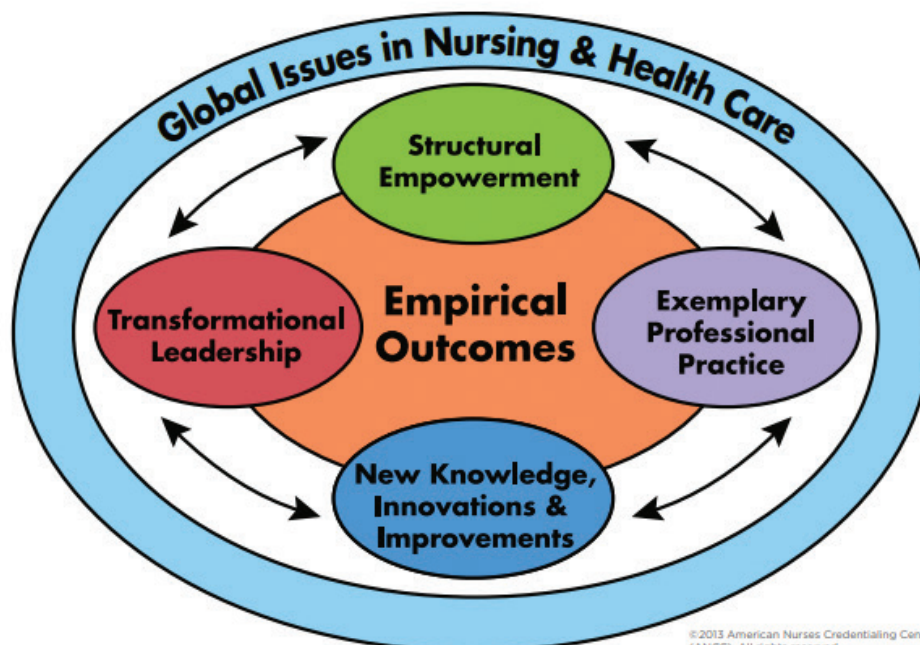

The Magnet Model



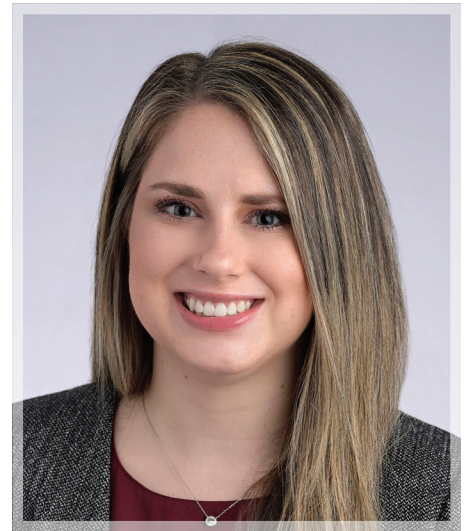
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Message from your Nursing Congress leaders

Nursing Professional Practice Model: Our foundation of care

The Norton Healthcare Nursing Professional Practice Model has “care” at its center because caring is at the core of everything we do. Nurses at Norton Children's embrace and live out Kristen M. Swanson's Theory of Caring every day. The elements of maintaining belief, knowing, being with, doing for and enabling guide our daily practice and interactions with patients and families. For this reason, the theory is prominently displayed in our Nursing Professional Practice Model along with our guiding principles of evidence-based practice, advocacy, integrity, empowerment, respect, and equity and inclusion.

Nursing Professional Practice Model



- Our nursing professionals live out Kristen Swanson's Theory of Caring.
- **Maintaining belief** – A perspective of hope and belief that the patient can handle the challenges that could await
- **Knowing** – No assumptions, but clarity and understanding the patient's point of view
- **Being with** – Showing up and being there for the patient
- **Doing for** – Helping the patient with tasks they normally would do for themselves
- **Enabling** – Giving the patient room to heal

- **Evidence-based practice** – Providing holistic quality care based on current research and knowledge
- **Advocacy** – Safeguarding, valuing, mediating and championing social justice within provision of care
- **Integrity** – Soundness of moral character and honesty
- **Empowerment** – Supporting professional governance, open leadership communication and team relationships
- **Respect** – Intentional act of showing consideration for others' interests and well-being
- **Equity and inclusion** – Freedom from bias and ensuring a sense of belonging to all

Code Lavender

Transformational leadership at Norton Children's Hospital can be seen in the efforts of our leaders to support employees and reduce burnout to improve employees' overall well-being. An example of this is the implementation of Code Lavender.

Code Lavender is a program designed to provide immediate and ongoing support to health care providers in times of emotional distress. It is one of the tools leaders use at Norton Children's to support our employees' overall well-being and minimize burnout.

Physicians, nurses, advanced practice providers and ancillary employees at Norton Children's Hospital often face difficult situations that can have a significant emotional

and physical impact on their overall well-being. These include situations such as patient deaths, trauma, codes, ethical care and social dilemmas, and workplace violence from patients and family members, as well as extremely busy shifts or learning of a serious illness or death of a co-worker.

Code Lavender was piloted in our pediatric intensive care unit, and then expanded to all of Norton Children's Hospital on July 1, 2024. Employees are encouraged to call or request a Code Lavender response whenever they feel a need exists. Leaders respond with a "Code Lavender cart" filled with drinks, snacks, relaxation tools, inspirational/motivational cards, and other self-care items such as lotions, lip balm, face masks, shower

steamers, tissues and much more. The items in the cart are intended to help the team decompress and take some much-needed time to care for themselves. We offer chaplain support and facility dog visits as well. Leaders can coordinate additional debriefings with the team when necessary.

Through the Code Lavender response, leaders provide support for our teams, encourage self-care and acknowledge the emotional toll that sometimes results from working in health care.

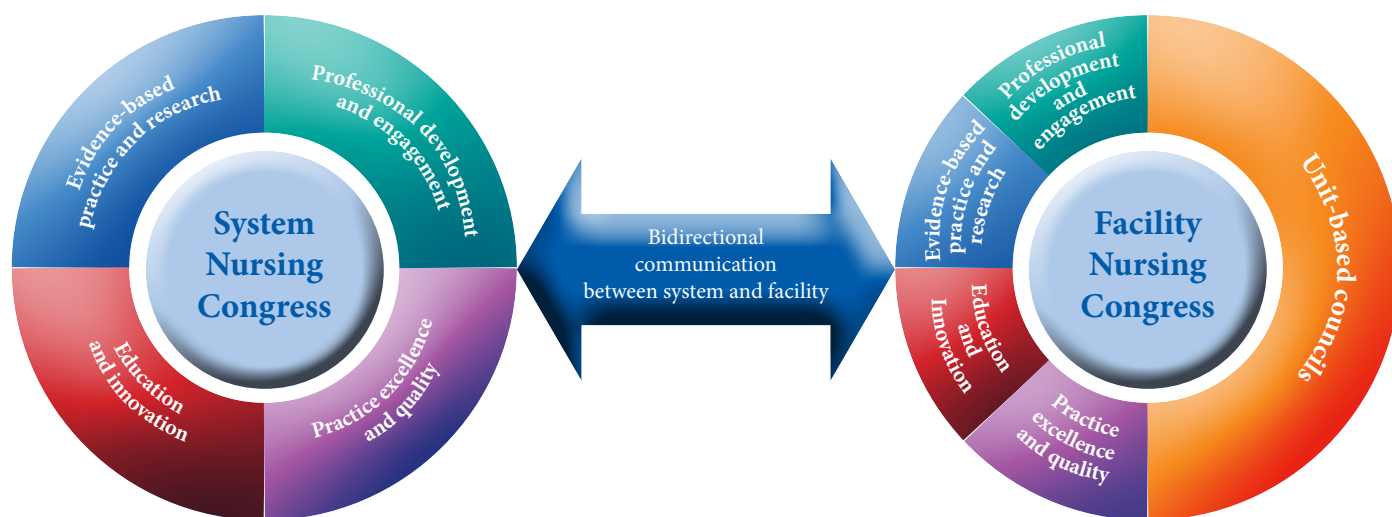

Professional growth at the bedside and beyond

Nurses are essential to the care we provide. Nurses at Norton Children's Hospital are dedicated professionals who lead the way in bringing innovative, compassionate care to the bedside.

We support our nurses to be lifelong learners and advocates for the children and families we serve. When nurses

have opportunities to advance their knowledge and skills, they become more confident, and the quality of patient care grows right along with them.

We support professional growth for nurses across the spectrum, from those who are just beginning their nursing careers to the experienced nurses who have dedicated many years to patient care. In addition to new employee onboarding, other programs are available to support professional growth. Here are few examples:

NORTON HEALTHCARE ENCOMPASS NURSE RESIDENCY PROGRAM: This program was designed to assist new nursing graduates in developing the skills necessary to be successful in their career. It includes learning opportunities and workshops on important topics such as critical thinking skills, leadership abilities, communication skills, patient safety and quality outcomes, evidence-based practice and career development.

IGNITE LEARNING SERIES: This collaborative program for nurses and advanced practice providers offers an interactive learning experience leveraging high-fidelity simulation. Learning opportunities include a variety of topics that affect pediatric care and services. Continuing education credits are offered.

LEAD FOR CARE: This program is designed to advance leadership skills among front-line clinical nursing staff, promoting and empowering their professional growth toward becoming a bedside leader. Research has shown that when leadership skills are deployed at the bedside, it leads to a reduced likelihood of medical errors and serious safety events. It also is linked to improvements in work experience, professional growth and job satisfaction. Nominations for this six-month program are for nurses who are working at the bedside and are engaged, motivated and ready to grow and expand their knowledge and skills. More than 200 nurses have completed Norton Children's Hospital's Lead for Care program.



PROFESSIONAL CERTIFICATIONS

Norton Healthcare offers financial support and resources for nurses who are interested in pursuing a certification relevant to their area of practice. Eligible certifications must be accredited by the Accreditation Board for Specialty Nursing Certification (ABSNC), National Commission for Certifying Agencies (NCCA), American National Standards Institute (ANSI) ISO 17024 or another recognized accreditor.

NORTON HEALTHCARE CLINICAL ADVANCEMENT PROGRAM

This program encourages and supports the continued professional growth and development of direct care nurses. It also provides opportunities for nurses to be recognized and rewarded for their clinical achievements; advancing their skills, knowledge and education; and their involvement in philanthropy and community leadership.

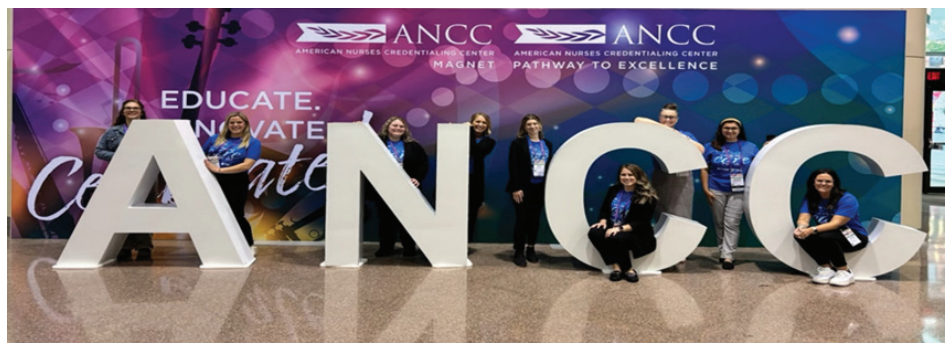
LEADER ONBOARDING (FORMERLY N THE KNOW)

This systemwide program helps new leaders learn necessary skills as they transition into formal leadership positions.

Exemplary professional practice is a hallmark of nursing care in Magnet-designated organizations. As we continue our Magnet journey, we want to recognize the many ways our nurses contribute to high-quality care, excellent patient outcomes and a culture that truly embraces safety.

“Exemplary professional practice by design is a demonstration of a facility's competence and commitment to continuously enhance in one's profession. At Norton Children's Hospital, we encourage our nurses and interdisciplinary personnel to become involved in professional nursing governance to ensure our bedside care teams continue to enrich the high-quality level of patient-centered care we provide to our patients using evidence-based practice. All our teams at Norton Children's Hospital strive to act with integrity and accountability, advocate as appropriate, and collaborate among disciplines to achieve the goal of respecting every person and providing safe, exceptional care to our patients.”

Nurses make a difference!

In response to seeing a growing number of newborns who are smaller than usual, Daulton Walls, RN-BSN, MBA, assistant nurse manager, neonatal intensive care unit (NICU), proposed implementing a tiny baby unit by designating a specific area within the Norton Children's Hospital NICU. “Tiny babies” are those weighing less than 2 pounds, 12 ounces (1,250 grams). These tiny babies are at high risk for neurological problems and other long-term health issues and comorbidities. Research shows that tiny baby units support the delivery of safe, high-quality care for these fragile babies and improved their outcomes.

Daulton began by organizing a group of NICU team members to create a structure, set goals and develop an implementation plan that included education regarding the rationale for a tiny baby unit. Daulton also garnered support from Norton Children's Hospital leadership to change the staffing grids and provide the financial support needed to implement a tiny baby unit. It took this dedicated interdisciplinary team over a year to prepare and plan for opening the new unit. Bedside/clinical nurses were instrumental in the process design, planning and product reviews, as well as the development and implementation of nursing education.

On April 1, 2024, the tiny baby unit opened with 12 dedicated beds and a team of nurses trained to provide the highly specialized care required for our tiniest patients. To ensure the high-level care and maximize outcomes for these at-risk and vulnerable infants, the tiny baby unit follows these best practices:

- Standardized delivery room management
- Predelivery huddle
- Ongoing neuroprotective care to support and protect the baby's developing brain. Neuroprotective interventions consist of creating a healing environment that takes sensory stimulation into consideration.
 - » Reducing noise
 - » Optimizing lighting to help regulate sleep cycles
 - » Proper positioning and handling
- Early and frequent parental involvement
 - » Skin-to-skin holding
 - » First holding within three days of life



Safety is a priority

Norton Children's Hospital is committed to ensuring a safe environment of care for everyone. This includes our patients, their families and visitors, as well as our dedicated nurses, physicians, and other care and service providers. Addressing workplace violence in health care is complicated. Patients and families often are in crisis and may feel vulnerable. Additionally, providing care requires close physical proximity to the patient and frequent interactions with caregivers. Due to this complexity, Norton Children's decided on a multifaceted approach, including Welle Training for workplace safety, early identification and response to potential threats of violence, and targeted efforts to improve care for patients with behavioral health care needs.

WELLE TRAINING

In 2024, Norton Healthcare implemented Welle Training for all employees. Our Welle program includes six levels based on an employee's department and potential risk level. The Welle training program is rooted in incident prevention with a focus on early recognition of escalating behaviors and verbal de-escalation methods. The program also includes physical interventions and strategies for employees in high-risk areas. Welle safety training offers employees the necessary skills to respond in high-risk situations that place our patients and team members at risk.

SAFETY ASSESSMENT TEAM MEETINGS

Once a potential high-risk situation has been identified with a parent, family member, guest or patient, an interdisciplinary group convenes to discuss the situation and develop a safety plan. This plan consists of immediate and ongoing actions and goals to maintain a safe environment for everyone while minimizing disruptions in patient care.

CARING FOR BEHAVIORAL HEALTH PATIENTS

According to the Children's Hospital Association, from 2016 to 2021, children's hospitals across the nation saw a 31% increase in mental health inpatient visits for children and teens ages 3 to 18.

Norton Children's Hospital has experienced an increase in children and adolescents presenting with behavioral health needs. As a result, we often have an overflow of about 10 behavioral health patients a day on our medical floors. The overflow of patients has led to increased employee injury and workplace violence incidents.



Caring for behavioral health patients

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH CARTS

Caleb Fulkerson, R.N., BSN, assistant nurse manager, transitional care unit, was instrumental in improving care for patients at risk for agitation or aggressive behaviors. Caleb recognized that staff were spending too much time locating the necessary equipment and supplies to maintain safety and provide the appropriate care for these patients. Having the necessary items easily available in these situations reduces the risk of patient and staff injury and improves care. Caleb wanted to ensure that nurses were spending less time gathering supplies and more time caring directly for the patient. The 7 East behavioral health cart went live in June 2024. Since then, other Norton Children's Hospital inpatient units have adopted this practice and created their own behavioral health carts. Thank you, Caleb!

STOPLIGHT PROTOCOL

In addition to the behavioral health cart implementation, an interdisciplinary team was formed in 2024 to address the growing behavioral health crisis. The team created a new Stoplight protocol to increase staff awareness of patients at risk for agitation and aggression. As part of this process, the team developed educational tools with a focus on trauma-informed care, as well as reinforcing the de-escalation skills learned in Welle Training.

BEHAVIORAL HEALTH EXPERTISE

To provide much-needed support for our nurses and patients, a behavioral health nurse or health associate is assigned each day to assist with the care of these patients.

WHAT'S NEXT IN 2025?

- The creation of a new pediatric screening tool in our Epic electronic medical records system to identify patients who are at risk for agitation and aggression
- An updated physician order set
- A new pediatric behavior risk precaution
- Implementing a Behavioral Emergency Response Team (BERT)

DAISY Award

We currently are working on the first-ever Norton Healthcare/Norton Children's systemwide project to address barriers to bedside handoff. This work will help us build processes that promote closed-loop communication for patients, caregivers and staff.”

Project LightN

Project LightN launched in 2022 in response to the growing documentation requirements experienced by nurses, providers and other caregivers across the Norton Healthcare/Norton Children's system. Erik Martin, vice president, patient care services and chief nursing officer, Norton Children's Hospital, is the executive sponsor for this project.

Nursing documentation is cumbersome and can take away from precious time with our patients. Project LightN includes three work groups charged with determining documentation needs that support patient care and team communication. They also provide input on content and possible solutions, and ultimately vote on recommended changes.

- Best Practice Advisory Analysis task force
- Guardrails Group task force
- Bedside Nurse Team

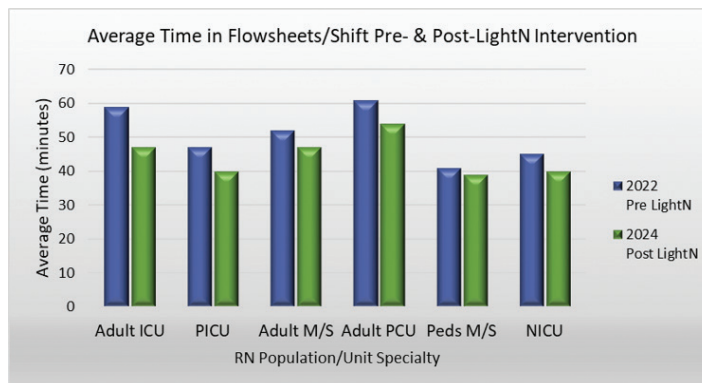

As of 2024, 25 best practice advisories have been retired and 59 rows have been reduced in nursing flowsheets. Nurses at Norton Healthcare are spending six fewer minutes per shift documenting in flowsheets — a 12% reduction. As the chart demonstrates, the neonatal intensive care unit has experienced the largest reduction in average time in flowsheets for the pediatric population, and this work continues.
